## "Period. End of Sentence": Transforming a Taboo into a Cause -The 2018 Short/Documentary Oscar Award Winning Movie

Come join us in watching this documentary which focuses on girls and women, especially those in underdeveloped countries, who miss out on educational and employment opportunities due to the lack of affordable means of dealing with their basic biological functions. In a rural village outside Delhi, India, women lead a quiet revolution. They fight against the deeply rooted stigma of menstruation. For generations, these women didn't have access to pads, which leads to health problems and girls missing school or dropping out entirely. But when a sanitary pad machine is installed in the village, the women learn to manufacture and market their own pads, empowering women of their community. They were enabled by the work of high school girls half a world away in California, who raised the initial money for the machine and began a non-profit called "The Pad Project". This issue is also being addressed by Freweine Mebrahtu of Ethiopia, who has dedicated her life to keeping girls in school by designing a reusable menstrual pad and trying to end the cultural stigma around this issue and was named 2019 CNN Hero of the Year. Two of OUR branch members Kay Alexander and Kathy Kinley, who have been involved in the Pathways/Africa project which addresses this and other issues involving African women and girls, will be speaking to us about their experiences in South Africa

## STEM Education Act for Rural Schools introduced in House While Cuts in STEM funds loom in 2020

A new bill, H.R. 4979 - Rural STEM Education Act, was introduced in the House on November 5, 2019, to address the lack of STEM education opportunities for students in rural areas. The bipartisan legislation, introduced by Rep. Frank Lucas (R-Okla.) and cosponsored by members on the Science Committee, would provide funding for the National Science Foundation to create research grants identifying effective STEM practices and programs for both educators and students in rural areas. After much work on the bill by legislators, afterschool and out-of-school time STEM programs would now be eligible as partners on these projects.

At this time the bill has only been introduced in the House, but a companion bill in the Senate is in the making. If all goes well, the Rural STEM Education Act could become law soon. While AAUW does not have a specific position on this bill, members can consider advocating for this bill's passage with their legislators.

In December, 2018, the Trump administration released its five-year STEM education strategy, *Charting a Course for Success: America's Strategy for STEM Education*.

The administration's STEM plan was well received by the STEM community, but how does it stack up with the administration's budget requests for STEM education?

While the STEM plan calls for greater prioritization of STEM education, the latest budget proposal for 2020 actually <u>cuts</u> funding for these programs by \$540 million to \$2.66 billion.

While the afterschool STEM field welcomes the administration's emphasis on equity and diversity within the plan, a commitment to fully fund STEM education programs that address these barriers must be shown, according to the Afterschool Alliance on STEM education, a D.C.-based, non-partisan organization. Significantly, a recent survey by the American Association of School Superintendents corroborates this need. It found that providing new STEM opportunities was the top priority for their Title IV-A funds.

Increasing investments in Title IV-A, along with the Rural STEM Education Act, would go a long way towards addressing the equity barriers in STEM programming for students across the country. *Kathy Henkins, Public Policy Chair*


