Are You Ready to See the Equal Rights Amendment Added to the Constitution?

What, some may ask, isn't it already an Amendment? One poll showed 80% of those responding had that mistaken idea. It has been an almost 100-year fight to enact an equal rights amendment, a real see-saw, and it is now set to become a major court battle. Under the ERA, "equality of rights under the law [would] not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex."

The amendment was formally proposed to Congress back in 1923 by the National Woman's political party, and finally issued as a resolution in 1972 with support on both sides of the aisle and President Nixon. Though a 3-year time limit extension was given (until 1982), the resolution failed to receive the required 38 states to ratify it. On top of that, five states have voted to rescind their ratification: Nebraska, Tennessee, Idaho, Kentucky and So. Dakota. However, nowhere in the Constitution is there provision allowing states to un-ratify an amendment resolution.

During the 1980s, Ruth Bader Ginsburg helped persuade the Supreme Court to extend the equal protection clause of the 14th Amendment to prohibit unequal treatment on the basis of sex — similar to what the E.R.A. would have done. But E.R.A. supporters say that clause doesn't go far enough, particularly when it comes to violence against women, sexual harassment and equal pay. The E.R.A. would require states to intervene in cases of gender violence, such as domestic violence and sexual harassment; it would guard against pregnancy and motherhood discrimination federally, as well as federally guaranteed equal pay.

Arguments against the E.R.A. include that laws could not be passed to protect men and women differently, implying all laws must affect men and women equally. Also that it has the potential to backfire on the greater mission of the women's rights movement. If the ERA is ratified, it would be more difficult to pass laws that specifically protect women, just as the Plessy v. Ferguson case was lost because the Supreme Court ruled that 14th Amendment equal rights were upheld when "separate but equal" public facilities were designated for black and white people.

In 2017 and 2018, Nevada and Illinois ratified the E.R.A., and on Jan. 27 Virginia made the total 38. Now the courts will have to duke it out on the ability for an amendment to receive final ratification long after its deadline (precedent set with the 27th Amendment "Congressional Pay" in 1992, more than 200 years after it

was sent to the states) and whether a state can rescind its ratification.
