Sexual Harassment of Tipped Employees

The national AAUW leadership recently announced its gender policy agenda, which outlines our 2020 election season priority issues. The organization's overriding priorities, as you probably know, are in Education, like strengthening Title IX and ensuring women and girls' access to STEM occupations; Foundational Rights, for instance protecting the right to vote; and promoting access to high-quality health care; and Economic Security. One 2020 subsection of Economic Security is entitled Raise the Minimum Wage and Eliminate the Tipped Minimum Wage.

Living in California, you might, as I did, assume that the lower minimum wage given to tipped employees was a thing of the past. But I've learned that it isn't, and that in 43 states it can be a situation fraught with a high incidence of sexual harassment, especially in restaurants, where a majority of tipped employees work. Although just 7 percent of the workforce is employed at a restaurant, the food and hospitality industry makes up 14 percent of harassment complaints to the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission.

Taria Vines worked in New York City's restaurant industry for a decade. "I know what it is to live on \$2.13 an hour," she said . . . choking back tears. She experienced harassment from customers, managers, kitchen staff, and fellow servers. Once, before she could take their order, a couple asked her to show them her tongue ring and lift her skirt to expose a thigh tattoo. "They said they'd leave me an even bigger tip if I did all of this."

This interview with Vines was part of an article published in Feb. 2018 by Rewire News. It also reported that "Since 1996, federal law has allowed the six million people in the United States who work for tips to be paid \$2.13. But seven states—Alaska, California, Minnesota, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, and Washington—have established minimum wage laws that treat all workers the same, mandating that everyone make at least the same amount, tipped or not."

According to the Jan. 2020 U.S. Dept. of Labor report, it is still only those seven states requiring across-the-board minimum wage rates. This injustice is part of the reason for AAUW's advocacy for bills like the H.R. 2148: Bringing an End to Harassment by Enhancing Accountability and Rejecting Discrimination in the Workplace Act (BE HEARD), currently referred to the Subcommittee on the Constitution, Civil Rights, and Civil Liberties. Equitable and equal minimum wage is fundamentally about empowerment. Saru Jayaraman,

president of Restaurant Opportunities Centers (ROC) United, says, "When you reduce the power imbalance by giving women . . . the full minimum wage . . . a woman has greater power, greater agency, and doesn't have to put up with everything."
