We Recognize Tech Trek Applicants

Just as we were selecting the girls to attend the 2020 Tech Trek at UC Santa Barbara, the schools shut down. Working with teacher recommendations, applications, and essays; we selected seven girls from Upland Jr. High. Unfortunately, all Teck Trek camps were canceled, but we want our members to "meet" the girls and congratulate them for their interest in STEM.

Alessandra Sandoval is interested in reducing microplastics in our water and oceans. She indicates that the average human is thought to ingest 100,000 pieces of microplastics a year. Her teacher says she excels in math, finishes her work quickly and then does extension assignments. Lynn Harb's teacher says, "When given new challenges, she is visibly excited and to watch her process is exciting; you can hear her frustrations, her ability to bounce back and to begin to make connections. Lynn says, "If students were more engaged in math, it would lead us to a brighter and more hopeful future." Hayley Medina believes math can make the world a better place through making new apps by coding, helping develop new spacecraft, and making new and improved inventions for the world. Her teacher says, "Hayley has an inner drive and wants to learn new things."

Ivy Cisneros believes that math and science help us understand patterns and solve different parts of the puzzle. Her teacher says, "She desires to find out both the how and why something works. She is super focused and doesn't allow things to deter her from finding a solution." Aaliyah Calderon wants to use biology to help cure diseases and create better care for everyone. Her teacher feels her aptitude is such that she deserves to see what is out there for her. Isabella Gendorf would have made a great Santa Barbara camper since she wants to be a marine biologist. "She is always up for a challenge. She perseveres until she accomplishes her task," says her math teacher. Karol Huicochea wants to invent transportation which would reduce pollution. Her instructor felt that Tech Trek's "unique atmosphere will open her eyes to different possible futures that she may not have thought of before."

We are very sorry that we could not provide these amazing girls with the Tech Trek experience. We did send them letters of congratulations on their selection and are sending them Tech Trek tee shirts. **Leticia Fernandez**, OUR student member and Tech Trek Alumnae coordinator is preparing some math and science exercises and experiments they can do at home and arranging for professional speakers.
