

# Systemic Racism and the Gender Pay Gap

August 3, 2021 was an inauspicious day, the day (over 7 months into 2021) symbolizing how far into the year Black women must work to earn what White men earned by the end of 2020. Averaging all women's wages, Equal Pay Day was March 24. Setting aside the important question of why women are still paid less than men, why are the two categories of women so statistically disparate?

Formerly enslaved women, when freed, still faced economic oppression (as did men); laws restricted the type of work Black people could do or, in some states, required an expensive license to practice any trade, thus leaving only agriculture and domestic work to pay the bills and feed the family. A lot of information about this ingrained exploitation is explained in "Systemic Racism and the Gender Pay Gap" — an insightful article on the national AAUW website.

The low wages paid for this work were not, and are not today, enough to allow Black people to save to purchase land or a house (one of the most common ways of accumulating wealth and passing it to one's children). Black women are over-represented (13%) in the poorly-compensated domestic service industry.\* People of color are also a large percentage of the lowest-ranking workers in hospitals and clinics. "The COVID-19 pandemic has laid bare the fact that the least powerful women in our society end up doing the most dangerous and dirtiest work, " according to the AAUW article. Currently, nearly half of all Black and Latino workers make less than \$15 an hour, according to the Fact sheet for the Raise the Wage Act. Add that to occupational segregation, and it will take much longer for women of color to attain full pay equality, which is over 100 years away.

Admittedly, the year 2069 is too long to wait for White women to achieve pay equity, but Black women will wait until 2369 and Latinas until 2451. Our organization speaks out for changes, now, including:

1. Make existing pay equity laws stronger: Congress should pass laws like the Paycheck Fairness Act. AAUW has worked for decades to pass this landmark legislation to advance pay equity, and this is the year it may triumph. Now that PFA has passed the House, it is one of several AAUW public policy priorities waiting for action in the Senate. And the Senate has its own PFA bill. **These bipartisan bills need your vocal support now more than ever.** 

2. Raise the minimum wage and eliminate the tipped minimum wage: The Raise the Wage Act will gradually increase the Federal minimum wage to \$15 an hour by 2025. It will lift millions of people out of poverty and increase wages for about 23 million women, many of whom are their family's primary breadwinner. Two-thirds of tipped workers are women, and tipped women of color make notably less than their tipped white male and female counterparts.

3. Improve paid leave and child care support: A median-income Black family with two children has to spend 56% of its income on child care—a larger share than any other group, all groups averaging 17% of a dualearning household's income (21% in CA). The Family and Medical Insurance Leave (FAMILY) Act would create a national paid family and medical leave insurance program for all American workers. And the Healthy Families Act would allow all workers to earn paid sick days to cover temporary and minor illnesses and caregiving.

The AAUW article says it succinctly, "The wage gap is an intentional, structural problem that demands intentional, structural solutions."

\*Recently 45% of those in domestic service are Latina.

## OUR STATUS OF WOMEN RECIPIENT Dr. Sara Kahn



Having lived through a pandemic, this year the Ontario-Rancho-Upland AAUW wanted to recognize someone who was instrumental in helping our community survive the pandemic. We wanted to acknowledge someone who was there—on the very front line each and every day. The person we have chosen to receive the **Status of Women Award for 2021 is Dr. Sara Khan.** 

Dr. Sara Khan is Director of Medical Affairs at San Antonio Regional Hospital in Upland, California. San Antonio has 363 beds, a staff of over 600 physicians, 2,400 employees, and 500 volunteers. The hospital is widely recognized as a premier medical center offering advanced patient care throughout the Inland Empire.

Dr. Khan joined the San Antonio Regional Hospital Medical Staff in 2008 and has held a number of leadership positions during her tenure. Most notably, Dr. Khan served as Chief of Medical Staff in 2020, leading the medical staff's response to the COVID pandemic. In addition to supporting her physician colleagues, Dr. Khan worked closely with the entire San Antonio Care Team in developing care plans, protocols, and safety measures to address the complicated and deadly nature of the pandemic. San Antonio Regional Hospital was at the center of the pandemic response and treated the highest number of COVID inpatients seen in any hospital in the Inland Empire. It is hard to imagine the tremendous responsibilities required of Dr. Khan at that time.

Dr. Khan attended medical school at Ziauddin Medical University in Pakistan and then completed her residency in internal medicine at Wright State University in Ohio. Dr. Khan has a private medical practice in Upland and serves as a hospitalist, in addition to her responsibilities as Director of Medical Affairs at San Antonio Regional Hospital.

In addition to all that she did during the pandemic, Dr. Khan arranged for and funded the installation of a memorial at the entrance to the hospital across from the fountain. It is a lovely strawberry tree and plaque and we have a picture to share with you. I understand that Dr. Khan also is responsible for the wording on the plaque. In case you cannot see it all, it says: "This memorial tree represents all those touched by COVID-19, those who survived, those who were lost, those who were left behind, and the amazing team of healthcare professionals who cared for them. Your courage, perseverance, and the place you have in our hearts will always be remembered."

Dr. Khan was also recently recognized for her outstanding leadership during the pandemic and was featured in the Inland Empire Magazine's June 2021 issue.

Dr. Khan was presented with our Status of Women award at her office in San Antonio Hospital in June and this is the picture of that event. She certainly epitomizes all for which AAUW advocates and she is the perfect role model for young women and girls in our community. We are so pleased and it is my honor to have presented this award to Dr. Sara Khan. She was with us at OUR June Installation Branch Meeting via Zoom to officially accept the award.
