### MEMBERSHIP



Quincey Grace is a California artist who got her start in the art world by painting bright and crazy furniture in the early 1990s.

She learned how to paint and decoupage furniture from a jewelry vendor at the Rose Bowl Swap Meet. She wanted to buy the vendor's display table, and instead, the vendor described how to apply decoupage to furniture, and pointed out where Quincey could buy used furniture at the swap meet so she could paint some herself.

When her neighbors saw the furniture, they suggested she should sell it at the Folk Music Store in downtown Claremont. It sold like gangbusters which emboldened her to sell it through galleries in Laguna Beach, Malibu, Scottsdale Arizona, San Antonio Texas and two locations on Madison Avenue in NYC.

In 1994 she stepped away from art to devote 100% of her time to her ongoing profession-teaching high school English for the next 28 years until she retired in 2019.

In 2018 she took 2 hand building classes from The Clav Yard in Ontario, followed by 4 classes at the American Museum of Ceramic Arts in 2019.

Before she had a chance to take any class on how to create armatures for sculptures, COVID closed down AMOCA, which led her to invent her own armature system using fabric, dowels, & pillow stuffing. Her internal support system (i.e. armature) makes the creation of a sculpture's basic form very quick and simple. It also has the added beauty of being reusable time and again.

In October of 2020, she attended the California Conference for the Advancement of Ceramic Arts at the John Natsoulas Gallery in downtown Davis, where she met John Toki, ceramic artist and the author of "Hands in Clay." When he saw the images of her work on her business card, and heard her description of her armature technique, he asked her if he could feature the photo of her work and a description of her technique in his sixth edition (due out in March of 2022) of Hands in Clay. Of course

she said YES.

So, now she's traveling down the path of her second career as a ceramic artist.

### CALIFORNIA AAUW LEGISLATIVE BILLS OF HIGHEST PRIORITY

In the 2022 California Legislative year, based on the AAUW Public Policy Priorities, there are 31 bills which our organization supports. Six bills are related to Economic Security for All Women, seven are related to Equal Access to Public Education, and 18 are related to Social and Racial Justice for all Members of Society. The highest priority bills were presented recently by California Public Policy Co-Chairs Kathleen Harper and Sue Miller and are listed below:

**AB 92**—creates an equitable sliding scale for family fees to alleviate the burden on working families struggling to pay for childcare and early childhood education services. Co-sponsor

**AB 1666**—enables persons to come from outside California for abortions and not be impacted by laws of other states. Co-sponsor

**AB 1968**—mandates the creation of websites at CSU/UC campuses to assist sexual assault survivors.

**AB 2881**—student parents get priority enrollment, registration, and access to basic needs centers, enabling them to remain in California colleges.

**SB 523**—expands contraceptive coverage by requiring health plans to provide point-of-sale coverage without cost-sharing.

**SB 1375**—updates statutes relating to abortion care to allow nurse practitioners to practice under standard protocols to provide first-trimester abortion care..

### Current AAUW Funding **Opportunities** - Fellowships and Grants

AAUW is providing nearly \$5 million in funding to more After weathering the long pandemic, Writers than 260 fellowship and grant recipients in the 2021-2022 award year. The programs listed below help to advance equity for women and girls; strengthen AAUW's role in the global community; support efforts to eradicate the persistent challenges facing women and girls; and leverage opportunities to attract new audiences to our mission.

#### **American Fellowships**

**Overview:** The American Fellowship program began in 1888, a time when women were discouraged from pursuing an education. It is AAUW's largest fellowship program and the oldest non-institutional source of graduate funding for women in the United States. AAUW American Fellowships support women scholars who are pursuing full-time study to complete dissertations, conducting postdoctoral research full time, or preparing research for publication for eight consecutive weeks.

Funding: \$6,000-\$30,000 **Opens:** August 1 Deadline: November 1

#### **Career Development Grants**

**Overview:** Career Development Grants provide funding to women who hold a bachelor's degree and are preparing to advance or change careers or reenter the workforce in education, health and medical sciences, or social sciences. Primary consideration is given to women of color and women pursuing their first advanced degree or credentials in nontraditional fields.

Funding: \$2,000-\$12,000 **Opens:** August 1 **Deadline:** November 15

#### **Community Action Grants**

**Overview:** Community Action Grants provide funding to individuals, AAUW branches and AAUW state organizations as well as community-based nonprofits for innovative programs that promote education and equity through projects focused on encouraging girls to select, before entering college, the physical sciences or engineering as a career. Since 1972, AAUW has provided support to hundreds of communities across the United States. Funding: \$3,000-\$10,000 Opens: August 1 Deadline: December 1 Gloria Hailes, Fund VP
